SUN CITY CENTER SECURITY PATROL

The patrol was organized in 1981 to deter crime in the community. It began with 11 members driving their own cars. Today there are over 600 volunteers who use radio-equipped vehicles contributing almost 30,000 hours annually. The members are governed by an elected 7 member Board of Directors. The organization is funded by local residential and business donations, grants, and bequests. The organization is a 501 (c) (3) non-profit.

WHAT THE SECURITY PATROL DOES

2 cars are on patrol 12 hours a day, 363 days a year. During the holiday season, a third car is added to patrol businesses from Walmart to the Interstate. They are the point of contact with the Hillsborough County Sheriff's Department. They provide golf cart inspection and registration to Sun City Center residents which is then passed on to the Sheriff's Department (4 carts have been stolen in the last month). Wellness checks are done when an out-of-town relative cannot reach a loved one. They maintain House Contact Cards with emergency numbers for anyone going out of town. They help pet-lover groups locate lost pets. They coordinate with the Sheriff's Department with a Silver Alert search team. They operate a lost and found.

A hurricane reminder for anyone seasonal is that every item not bolted to stucco walls and inside our lanais be taken inside as to not become projectiles. Please remember to do this any time you are gone from your home for extended periods during hurricane season because your neighbor will be busy securing their own home.

Generators cannot be outside until after the hurricane passes.

Lastly whether you are a snowbird or permanent resident, your trees need to be trimmed regularly because they could be a potential danger to you or your neighbor's home. Per the management company, your untrimmed trees could be **your liability** if it damages your neighbor's home. If a hurricane is forming, make sure your trees are trimmed immediately.

HURRICANE STREET CHAIRMEN

As part of OUR GOOD NEIGHBORS, we want to have a contact person for each street during a hurricane because texting on cell phones works even during power outages (if they are charged). The contact person is who you can reach after the hurricane has moved through, owner needs are met, and damage has been assessed.

HURRICANE SEASON REMINDERS





Have an emergency plan in mind because a hurricane's path is unpredictable.

Before a hurricane is predicted is the time to stock up on necessities for obvious reasons.

Necessities may include paper plates/silverware, canned meat, fruit & vegetables that don't need refrigeration. Charcoal/propane, matches, and batteries.

Make sure you have a hand can opener if electricity is off.

Water (fill bathtubs, washing machine, or pails) (1 gallon per person for 3 days) for brushing teeth, washing hands, and flushing toilets.

Make sure your vehicle is always filled with gas.

Have cash on hand for those times when electricity is off to purchase things.

Fill medications.

Make sure your trees are trimmed regularly to not have pods become projectiles.

Secure the outside of your home by taking everything inside not bolted down.

Lanais are not safe storage for anything.

Hopefully by now, everyone has hurricane safe doors, garage doors, and either hurricane safe windows or shutters to protect their windows.

Generators should not be placed outside until after a hurricane passes to not become a projectile.

If you have invited someone to your home, their vehicle could become a projectile.
